The Plantagenets by Dan Jones

The Plantagenet dynasty ruled England for two and a half centuries, a period during which the national character was forged. Beginning with Henry II, who was called FitzEmpress after his formidable mother, Empress Matilda – wife of the Holy Roman Emperor and granddaughter of William the Conqueror, who very nearly became Queen of England in her own right 400 years before the Tudor Queens (but more about her in a forthcoming review) – the Plantagenet line is a procession of larger-than-life personalities whose mistakes and weaknesses proved to be just as influential to the development of England as their strengths and triumphs. Even great kings are not without their flaws, and the author does not flinch from pointing out the failings of the great or, for that matter, the virtues of the not-so-great.

Jones divides his narrative into 7 ‘ages’ based on some defining characteristic. ‘The Age of Shipwreck’ opens in 1120 with the death of William the Aetheling, the only legitimate heir of Henry I, and takes us through the ensuing chaos and conflict to the eventual succession of the Aetheling’s nephew, Henry FitzEmpress, and his ‘scandalous’ wife Eleanor of Aquitaine, who had already been Queen of France. The name Plantagenet was not actually used by Henry or any of the so-called Plantagenet kings; it was the surname of Henry’s father Geoffrey, Count of Anjou, Matilda’s second husband.

‘The Age of Empire’ describes the consolidation of England under Henry II as well as his and Eleanor’s vast holdings in France; the reign of their son Richard I and the Third Crusade; and the loss of much of that empire under the mismanagement of Richard’s brother and successor John (it can’t be an accident that England hasn’t had a King John since). John’s struggles continue in ‘The Age of Opposition,’ which sees the first signing of the Magna Carta (it would be hauled out and re-ratified many times) and the long and troubled reign of John’s son Henry III.

‘The Age of Arthur’ brings us to Edward I, called Longshanks. Arthurian legend was a popular craze at the time, and Edward took the legendary Briton hero (who was at that time considered to be historical) as his model much as his father had the sainted Saxon king Edward the Confessor. Longshanks was also called The Hammer of the Scots, and might as well have been called The Cudgel of the Welsh.

The reign of Edward II is ‘The Age of Violence’ – quite an epithet, considering the amount violence that was generally going on in everyone’s reign. The foolish and manipulable king provoked his nobles to the point of civil war with his failures of government and favoring of personal friends who had neither nobility nor merit. By the end of his reign, the queen and her lover had taken control, not only out of personal ambition but for the good of the kingdom (more about them in a forthcoming review, as well). Despite all this (or, perhaps, because of it) Edward II’s son would become one of the greatest of the Plantagenet kings, and Jones calls Edward III’s reign ‘The Age of Glory.’

Edward III reigned for 50 years and his first two sons preceded him to the grave, opening the way for the conflicts over succession that would develop into the Wars of the Roses and bring an end to the Plantagenet dynasty. Edward was succeeded by his grandson Richard, son of the Black Prince, who seemed to have inherited none of his father’s or grandfather’s strengths. ‘The Age of Revolution’ chronicles Richard II’s struggles to hold the throne and his discord with his cousin Henry Bolingbroke, also a grandson of Edward III, to whom Richard would eventually give up the crown.

Here Jones brings his saga to an end. Although Henry IV is technically another branch of the Plantagenets, the dynasty would not recover from the instability of Richard’s reign, and Bolingbroke’s accession in 1399 set off a period of turmoil that would end with a Tudor on the throne. Happily, Jones has written a book about that as well and I am eager to read it, because he is an excellent writer. From beginning to end The Plantagenets is one terrific read. Jones brings the people and the times to life with his vivid narrative. This is the kind of history that doesn’t need to be fictionalized to be fascinating, and Jones does it justice. We think we know these characters – some of them, at least, thanks to popular literature and movies. Henry II was immortalized by Peter O’Toole in the films Becket and The Lion in Winter, and his sons Richard the Lionheart and John Lackland have passed into legend as part of the framework of the Robin Hood stories. Longshanks hammers the Scots, and his blatantly incompetent son, in Braveheart; Richard II is ethereal and Henry Bolingbroke earthy in the BBC miniseries The Hollow Crown.

The real stories of these men and their lesser-known kinsmen are just as interesting and entertaining as the fictions that have grown up around them, if not moreso. Despite all that has already been written and dramatized about these figures, both popular and scholarly, Jones is able to keep them fresh. This is the best type of narrative non-fiction, neither overly dry nor overly dramatized, informative, engaging -- even engrossing -- eminently readable. Whatever you may have already read on the subject, I recommend *The Plantagenets* without reservation.

Recipes & Missives from Twelfth Night Cooks

We had the pleasure to be feast stewards for Tree-Girt-Sea's 12th Night this year. It was our idea to do a somewhat balanced feast between protein (meat) and vegetables yet keep it tasty and plentiful. Our first decision was to not do necessarily period recipes. We did try to stick with ingredients that were period though.

Here is what we served and the according recipe if applicable. Each recipe is for about 8 people. NOTE: I highly recommend Peoria Packing Butcher Shop for any meat you are purchasing rather personal or for feasts. You can sign up for a once a week email flyer with special sales through their website:

First course was bread and butter. (Bread purchased from the local Meijer grocery store and was a variety of their artisanal breads. Butter was Kerry Gold that we got on special at Tony's Finer Foods as a 2 for the price of 1.)

Second course was whole chicken and spinach. (The chickens we purchased from Sam's Club, already cooked, at less than \$5 per chicken. Picked them up the afternoon of the even and just had to keep them warm).

The spinach recipe is:

12 ounces of fresh baby spinach, 1 tablespoon olive oil, the juice of ¼ lemon.

Add spinach to boiling water, cook for 1 minute.

Drain; wring out. Toss with oil and salt (to taste).

Add Lemon juice and toss again.

Second course was cassoulet and kale. For the cassoulet:

1 pound Great Northern beans, 2 table spoons butter, 2 medium onions (sliced), 2 cloves of

Garlic (crushed), 1 bay leaf, ½ pound of sausage, 2 pieces of bacon, 2 tablespoons vegetable oil,

1 pound chicken, 2 to 3 teaspoons salt, 1 quart water or chicken stock.

Soak the beans in water overnight, drain them in the morning. Heat butter in saucepan and cook

onions and garlic over medium heat until soft. Add beans, bay leaf, bacon and water/stock.

Simmer, covered over low heat for two hours or until beans are tender. Brown sausages in oil,

Remove sausages, brown chicken in same pan. Add all to beans and cook in oven at 350° for approximately 1.5 hours (or until beans and meat are tender).

(Twelfth Night Recipes Continued)

For the kale:

1 teaspoon olive oil, 6 cloves garlic (minced), ¼ teaspoon salt, 8 ounces crimini or butto mushrooms (sliced), 1 pound kale (course stems removed, leaves sliced or torn into pieces), several pinches of freshly ground black pepper.

Saute the garlic in oil for about two minutes (do not burn it), add mushrooms and sprinkle the salt.

Cook for 5-7 minutes, stirring often, until the moisture has released and the mushrooms are lightly browned. Add the kale and pepper, use tongs and saute for about 10 more minutes.

The third course was roast pork with stewed pears.

For the pork I used Boston Butt roast, approximately 15 pounds. Other ingredients were sage, rosemary, 20 garlic cloves (crushed), fennel seeds, salt, black pepper, and olive oil.

First we scored the fat side of the roast in a grid pattern. At each intersection of the grid we stick in one garlic clove. With the other ingredients, mix them together and make a paste of sorts. Slather this over the roast. Then cook the roast at 350° for approximately 20 minutes per pound. Internal temperature of the pork should be 145° when it is done.

For the pear recipe it is 4 medium pears (we used bosc), 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, 2 tablespoons honey, and some balsamic vinegar.

Cut each pear into 8 wedges, removing core and stem. Melt butter in large skillet over medium heat. Add the pears and drizzle the honey over them. Cook until lightly brown (approximately 5 minutes). Remove from heat and drizzle several drops of balsamic vinegar on each pear.

Serve warm or at room temperature.

It was the second time that I had been to this event.

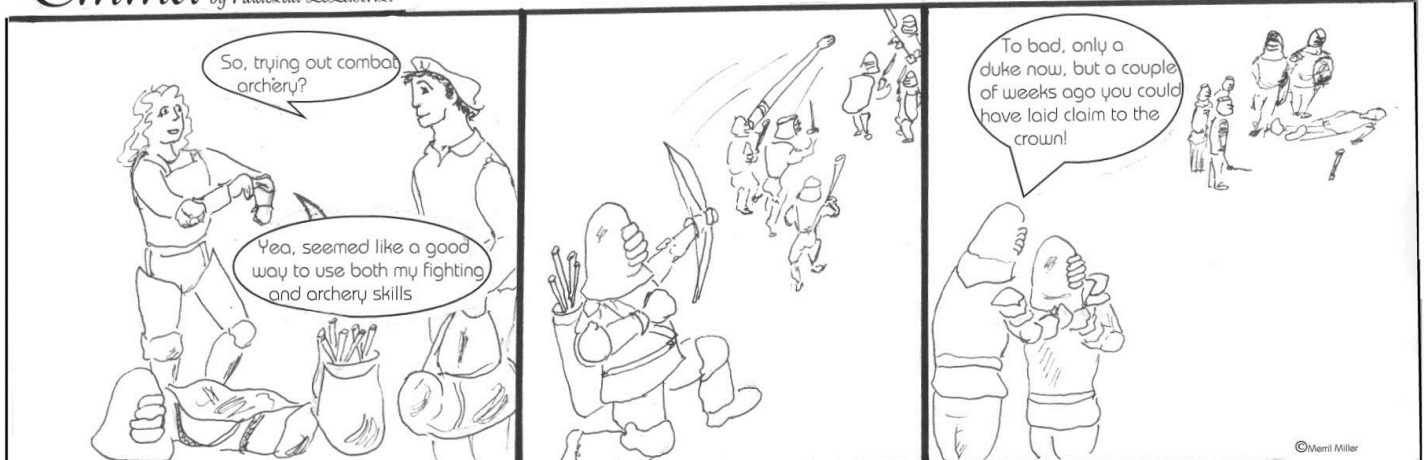
I burst with pride that day; I scored my first official kill!

Who are the People in Ayreton? Persona Questions by Lady Siobhán an Einigh

1) What is your full SCA name and titles?

Lady Siobhán an Einigh of Calontir, AoA, Companion of the Order of the Torse (Calon AoA service award), Order of the Willow

2) Location and date for your persona?

Connacht, Ireland, starting in the early 1000s, right around when Brian Boru was being a menace to the High King. I haven't fully decided if Siobhán is for or against Boru, but I think she's loyal to the Connachta (O'Neills).

3) Why did you choose that time and place for your persona?

Mundanely, I'm a linguist and anthropologist, and one of my specialities is Celtic studies. I have studied Old Irish, Modern Irish, Middle Welsh, Modern Welsh, Scottish Gaelic, and a bit of Brythonic, Manx and Breton. Ireland has one of the most distinct cultures of the set, as well as some of my favorite tales, so I chose there. Also because time-wise...I've always loved the history of the time of conflict around Brian Boru, the challenge he made to the Connachta Uí Neills (the standing line of High Kings).

4) What one cool thing can you share about the time period and location of your persona?

Ireland at the turn of the century was a time of change. The Uí Néill kingship line was being successfully challenged for the first time in its nine generation reign, the unification of many of the smaller kingships and clans, and a general setting of political turmoil. You've got the end of the Viking age, as well as the setup for the start of the Norman conquest of Ireland, making the perfect environment for a neat culture!

5) What one thing are you hoping to learn about your persona?

I'd like to learn all of the Carolingian style book bindings; I can do two of them reliably right now, but still have 2-3 more to go. I would also someday like

to write a full set of epic poetry in the Irish styles, although I know the Welsh cynganedd better, to call myself a true Bard. Basically I need to resolve all the disparate activities I do into one persona, but I'm not certain that one is possible!
